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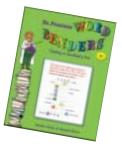

Grammar Disasters & Punctuation Faux Pas

Students develop real-life editing skills for superior writing, highest grades, and top test scores.

Goals

These effective, standards-based activities use thinking (not drill and practice) to sharpen grammar, punctuation, spelling, capitalization, and attention to detail.

Students analyze stories that contain errors in writing mechanics and content. They must carefully evaluate words and sentences for accuracy and also compare story details with information provided in pictures and captions. To correct each story, students insert, modify or delete punctuation, words, and short phrases. (Some Beginning level activities, also include multiple-choice questions.)

A-C level activities involve mixed-skills practice, starting with easier activities and becoming more challenging as students become adept at correcting the errors. Beginning level activities combine single-skill units (like capitalization) and guided, gradual instruction that's ideal for younger learners.

Each book includes an editing checklist to help focus students' thinking and an annotated guide to grammar, usage, and punctuation to help students match their answers to the correct rules.



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► Choosing the Right Level of Editor in Chief There is a slight increase in difficulty within each level (i.e., A2 is more challenging than A1, B2 than B1, etc.). Generally we recommend beginning with the first book at each level and finishing these activities before moving to the second book.






Gr. 4–12+ Choose from 3 Levels

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Students click on the text where they think an error has occurred (e.g., "board"). From the game menu, they select an error category like Punctuation, activating the Onscreen Guide, right.

Clicking on the correct rule fixes the error and allows students to continue.
